Failure to Comply	Violators will be charged with a misdemeanor pursuant to Code Section 38-3-7. However, enforcement officers should take reasonable steps to provide notice prior to making an arrest or issuing a citation.	p. 9
Shelter in Place	Residents are to stay at home or in place of residence unless for <u>Essential Services</u> , <u>Necessary Travel</u> , performance of <u>Minimum Basic Operations</u> , or are included in <u>Critical Infrastructure workforce</u> .	p. 2 & 3
Business Closures/Restrictions; Reopenings	 Businesses that are not Critical Infrastructure shall only engage in Minimum Basic Operations Prohibits restaurants and private social clubs from providing dine-in services. Takeout, curb side pick-up, and delivery are still permitted. Initially required certain businesses to cease operations, including gyms or fitness centers, bowling alleys, theatres, live performance venues, amusement rides, body art studios, businesses registered pursuant to Code Section 43-10-11 and 43-10-18, estheticians, hair designers, individuals licensed to practice massage therapy, and bars. Effective 4/24/20, under EO 4.20.20.02, those businesses are permitted to begin in-person Minimum Basic Operations. Must institute certain measures. 	p. 4, 6 & 7 (EO 4.02)

Social Distancing Requirements	No business, establishment, corporation, non-profit corporation, organization, or county or municipal government can allow more than ten people to gather at a single location if six feet of distance between individuals cannot be maintained. Excludes private residences. Individuals who are required to shelter in place may only receive visitors in certain cases, such as: Visitors providing medical or health services, supplies, or medications Visitors who provide support of daily living activities Visitors who are providing essential supplies and services (defined above) Visitors during end-of-life circumstances	p. 2, 7
