GENERAL TOPIC	SUMMARY	SECTION # of 17 th Supp
Effective Period	The initial stay at home order went into effect March 25, 2020 at 12:01 am. It has been supplemented and amended and restated a number of times, with changes in restrictions on businesses, travel, self-quarantine, and gatherings. The Seventeenth Supplemental Proclamation order was issued December 16, 2020. See Proclamations for updates.	
General	Reopening strategy was implemented by county, in phases. The state is currently in the “Act with Care” phase. There are four counties that apply different guidelines than the state: Oahu (Click Here), Kauai (Click Here), Maui County (Click Here), Hawaii county (Click Here).	
Stay at Home	Initially there was an express order to “stay at home.” It has been lifted (other than traveler self-quarantine described below). All persons shall comply with applicable guidance from the CDC as well as State, county, industry and regulatory requirements [Note that prior orders had contained restrictions on what were <u>permitted activities</u> outside the home. That section was deleted in the Tenth Supplement.]	III
Restrictions on Businesses – Reopened Businesses	The following businesses may operate: (a) the businesses or operations identified as <u>federal critical infrastructure sectors</u> , and (b) businesses or operations in accordance with the “State Roadmap to Resilience” (attached as Exhibit E to the order and also listed on Reopening Status Page). In the “Act with Care” stage, it appears that <u>all</u> businesses may open subject to restrictions. All businesses must comply with applicable safety, hygiene and physical distancing guidance from the CDC as well as with state, county, industry and regulatory practices adopted by Hawaii DOH	III
Gatherings	Each county in Hawai‘i currently has rules in place for gatherings. These regulations can include limits on group size, mask requirements, rules for parks and the beach, and more. Violations of these rules can result in fines, and the rules can change over time. See Gatherings for links to current	Gatherings

Travel; Lodging	<p>All hotels to adopt a health and safety plan.</p> <p>There continues to be a mandatory fourteen (14) days self-quarantine for all individuals entering the State of Hawaii, subject to exemptions (including an exemption for a pre-entry negative test). Specific provisions apply to car sharing, vehicle renting, and hosts in connection with quarantined visitors.</p> <p>All travelers arriving in Hawai'i from out of state will be required to comply with a screening requirement, outlined in Exhibit B to the Order.</p> <p>There are separate provisions relating to travel between counties.</p> <p>See Proclamations for updates. Face Masks	<p>All persons required to wear face coverings when in public. See Exhibit J to 17th Supplemental Proclamation</p> <p>See separate requirements for Oahu (Click Here), Kauai (Click Here), Maui County (Click Here), Hawaii county (Click Here).</p>	IIIB; Exhibit J
Other	Other provisions include suspension of various laws, licensing, time limit provisions.
