Travel	Exec Order 57 FY 19/20, effective 6/9/20, requires all persons traveling into Maine, including residents and non-residents of Maine, to either (a) receive a negative COVID-19 test, or (b) quarantine for 14 days upon arrival in Maine consistent with Exec Order 34 FY 19/20. Compliance by an individual is ascertained through a certificate of compliance developed by the Department of Economic and Community Development and will be used by lodging accommodations as a prerequisite to check-in.
