Intent	To ensure that the maximum number of people self-isolate in their places of residence to the maximum extent feasible, while enabling essential services to continue, and slow the spread of COVID-19.	§15	
Failure to Comply	Failure to comply will constitute a violation of a public health order and will be enforceable by the Attorney General, DPHHS, a county attorney, or other local authorities.	Section II	
Stay at Home	All individuals currently living in Montana are ordered to stay at home in their place of residence to the greatest extent possible. All public and private gatherings are generally prohibited, regardless of the number of people involved, unless distances of six feet can be maintained. Individuals may leave their homes only for Essential Businesses and Operations .	§1	
Business Closures/Restrictions	All businesses with operations in Montana (except Essential Businesses and Operations) are required to cease all activities at Montana facilities except for engaging in Minimum Basic Operations. Businesses, including non-Essential Businesses and Operations, can continue to operate if workers can work from their residences. Essential Businesses and Operations must engage in Social Distancing Requirements to the extent possible. The March 24, 2020 Directive that closes certain businesses to the public, while expanding delivery and to-go options, remains in effect (but the social distancing provisions for retail businesses are	§2	
Travel	superseded by these requirements). All travel is prohibited, except for Essential Travel and travel related to Essential Activities. Those leaving their homes or residences, or riding on public transit, must use Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible.	§4	
Superseding of County Orders	The Directive supersedes any and all less restrictive county orders. Counties may adopt more restrictive orders.	Pg. 9
