General	Tennessee had closed all nonessential businesses. It has implemented reopening of businesses in phases, in accordance with the Tennessee Pledge for Reopening, and the ERG Guidelines.	
	Counties with separate health departments are permitted to enact local regulations which are more or less stringent than any statewide orders. Counties without separate health departments are to comply with statewide orders.	
	See Exec Order 73 and Executive Orders for latest updates. Exec Order 73 is in effect through 2/27/21, and restates provisions from a number of prior orders (for example, Exec Order 38 and Exec Order 54).	
Shelter in Place/Stay at Home	Prior stay at home order (EO 22) was previously repealed. All persons "should" socially distance. (Per Exec Order 73, restating portions of Exec Order 38).	
	Persons with COVID-19 or COVID-19 symptoms <u>must</u> stay at home. (Per <u>Exec Order 73</u> , restating portions of <u>Exec Order 38</u>).	
All Businesses	The prior order restricting all nonessential businesses (EO 22) was previously repealed, effective 4/29/20.	
	All venues, employers, and businesses are expected to operate in accordance with, and to fulfill the spirit of, applicable operational	

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	guidance and measures adopted and/or issued by the ERG Guidelines . These include specific guidance for specific sectors, including Restaurants, Retail, Manufacturing, Exercise, Close Contact Businesses, Lodging, Recreation.	
	An employer shall not require or allow an employee who the employer knows has tested positive for COVID-19 to report to work until that employee has satisfied the conditions for discontinuing home isolation under CDC guidelines.

Restaurants/Bars	Restaurants and bars have previously been permitted to reopen, subject to ERG Guidelines .	
Gatherings	Under prior orders, gatherings of ten or more people were prohibited. These limits have been changed from time to time.	
	Under Exec Order 70 (as restated in Exec Order 73), social gatherings in indoor public places of more than 10 persons prohibited, subject to certain exceptions. See Exec Order 73 and Executive Orders for latest updates	
Facemask Requirements	In accordance with CDC guidance, persons, including employees or customers of businesses, are "strongly urged" to wear cloth face coverings or other similar coverings in public settings where being in close proximity to others is anticipated, and particularly where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain at all times. County mayors in counties that do not have a locally run county	
	health department shall have the authority to issue orders or measures requiring or recommending the wearing of face coverings within their jurisdiction, subject to limitations. See Exec Order 73 (restating portions of Exec Order 38 and Exec Order 54). See Executive Orders for latest updates	
Travel Restrictions	No restrictions.	
Limitation of Liability	Health care providers licensed, certified, or authorized under title 33, 63, or 68, who render services within the limits of their license, certification, or authorization are granted limited liability protection

Other	The provisions of EO 73 (and similar order) exclusively govern on the subjects it concerns in the 89 counties that do not have a locally- run county health department. The six locally-run county health departments in Davidson, Hamilton, Knox, Madison, Shelby, and Sullivan counties shall have authority to issue additional orders or measures related to the containment or management of COVID-19, which may be more or less restrictive than this Order. Nothing in this Order shall affect or limit local orders that do not contravene or limit the application of the provisions of this Order.
