Failure to Comply	Enforceable by any local law enforcement, and punishable by up to 30 days in prison and/or up to a \$250 fine.	§17
Shelter in Place of Residence (Stay at Home)	All individuals in State of WI are ordered to shelter in place in their place of residence. Individuals using shared or outdoor space must maintain as reasonably practicable social distances of at least 6 feet per the Social Distancing Requirements.  Persons may only leave home only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, to operate Essential Businesses and Operations, for Essential Travel, for Special Situations, and to engage in Minimum Basic Operations (see below).  Exceptions: Homeless individuals are not subject to shelter-in-place order, and those subject to unsafe residences (e.g. domestic	§1
Business Closures/Restrictions	violence) are permitted to find alternative residences.  All businesses with Wisconsin facilities must cease all activities at those facilities, except for <a href="Essential Businesses">Essential Businesses</a> and Operations and for <a href="Minimum Basic Operations">Minimum Basic Operations</a> . Businesses that remain open are, to the greatest extent feasible, to implement <a href="Social Distancing Requirements">Social Distancing Requirements</a> .  Emergency Order #28 added additional requirements for businesses that remain open, including: restricting number of workers present, increasing standards of facility cleaning, adopting policies to prevent workers from entering the premises if they display respiratory symptoms or have had contact with a person with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19.  Emergency Order #28 added provisions for Essential Businesses which are retail stores, including consideration of curbside pickup, required maximum occupancy limits (based on store size), lines to regulate entry by patrons.  Emergency Order #28 increased restrictions on libraries to online services only.	§2, 4
